#### **Action Fraud: How to protect yourself from Pet Fraud**

- **Do your research:** if you're making a purchase from a website or person you don't know and trust, carry out thorough research first and look at reviews.
- Trust your instincts: if you're unable to view the animal in person ask for a video call. If you're buying a young animal make sure you're able to see the mother and rest of the litter.
- Choose your payment method wisely: avoid paying by bank transfer. Credit card or payment services like PayPal give you a better chance of recovering your money if you become a victim of fraud.

#### **Number Plate Theft**

Stolen number plates can be used to disguise another car to aid crimes like ram-raiding, burglary, evading congestion charges, changing the identity of a stolen car so it can be sold, or driving off from petrol stations without paying.



Consider fitting your number plate with anti-theft security screws, which can be turned easily with a screwdriver to fit them but can't be undone using normal tools.

If your number plate does get stolen report it to the police (at <a href="www.hampshire.police.uk">www.hampshire.police.uk</a> or call 101), the DVLA and your insurance company. Replace your number plates as it is illegal to drive without them. ### **Fake TV Licensing Emails**

Action Fraud have received over 6000 reports in two weeks regarding fake emails claiming to be from TV Licensing. The email states that the licence is about to expire or there was an issue with the last payment.



Remember to always contact the organisation directly using contact details from their official website, don't use the contact details provided in the email or click on any links.

#### Get Safe Online - Date Safe Advice



Online dating is a popular way to meet someone, and January is the busiest time of year for both new and experienced online daters. However, this means that it's also a very busy time for cybercriminals, posing as suitors to steal your money or identity, or both. Get Safe Online have 10 top tips.

- If somebody you've met online asks you to send money, bank details or passwords, don't do it, whatever their hard luck story or other reason they give for needing it.
- ♥ Do a reverse image search to check if the profile photo is genuine or of somebody else, start by searching 'Search with an image on Google'.
- ▼ Tell a friend or family member where you're going before meeting up with an online date in person for the first time.
