New Bishop of Winchester Announced, July 2023

Leadership and Governance

t was a year of significant change in our leadership as we joyfully welcomed a new Archdeacon of Bournemouth, Jean Burgess, in June, shortly followed by the news in July that Philip Mounstephen, an experienced diocesan bishop already serving in the Diocese of Truro, was to become the 98th Bishop of Winchester. This was a long-awaited and much celebrated announcement, and the result of a great deal of prayer from across the diocese and the hard work of our dedicated Vacancy-in-See Committee. We were then very sad to say farewell to Bishop Debbie Sellin who left the diocese in November to become the Bishop of Peterborough, after four years of devoted service and exemplary leadership in challenging times.

Our Diocesan Synod and its three Houses (the House of Bishops, the House of Clergy, and the House of Laity) met 9 times over the year – in addition to 3 meetings of the Deanery Finance Chairs Forum and 6 meetings of the Diocesan Finance Committee. One of the key pieces of work was the Budget consultation process which resulted in the resounding approval of our three-year diocesan financial plan – and creating a template for discussion, consultation and collaboration with the whole diocese which is now being used in subsequent review processes.

The Bishop's Council continued its programme of reviews into different areas of diocesan work, commissioning reviews into the Winchester School of Mission, Clergy Housing, and the Common Mission Fund. As these Reviews report back they help us to continually reflect and improve on the support we offer, ensuring our structures, strategy and culture all align.

In Focus: Enabling Mission at Holy Saviour Bitterne

The Diocesan Finance Committee is responsible for reviewing and assessing loan applications from PCCs. In 2023, the parish of Bitterne in Southampton reached out for help to enable them to invest in a major refurbishment of their church faculties to better serve their community and engage in mission. The DFC was able to approve a large loan to enable this exciting work to continue without delays or penalties.

"We have been so incredibly well supported by the Diocesan team over the course of the Holy Saviour Redevelopment project – over 14 years in the planning. As with any significant building project, there were many hurdles with cash flow and ensuring that we continued to meet our financial commitments. The Finance committee were amazing in supporting us to meet our contractual obligations on numerous occasions through short term cash injections and longer term loans. Without such dynamic support and encouragement we may well have not managed to fulfil the long term vision and plans for redevelopment in Bitterne. Having only been fully open 2 months, we are already seeing what an incredible resource and blessing the building is both for the mission of the church and the blessing of the local community."

he Bishop's Staff Team (BST) changed shape in 2023, not only with a new Bishop of Winchester and Archdeacon of Bournemouth, but also as, following Bishop Debbie's move to Peterborough, the team benefitted from the experience of the Rt Revd Geoff Annas who generously agreed to serve as Acting Bishop of Southampton. Towards the end of the year, the team also said farewell to Revd Dr Philip Krinks as Bishop's Chaplain and welcomed Revd Theresa Ricketts to the role.

The varied work, both strategic and pastoral, of the BST in 2023 included many opportunities to visit parishes and schools, attending PCCs and other meetings, and for hosting Visitations and Clergy Breakfast Briefings, leading, preaching and licensing new clergy, as well some specific projects for 2023 which included: developing guidance and support for our Area Deans, investing in strategies for improving clergy wellbeing, and supporting initiatives such as Female Clergy Gatherings and the first Neuro-divergent Clergy Lunch.

Above all, though, the work of the BST, under Bishop Philip's leadership, is to provide effective over the work of the Diocese, addressing challenges, seeking opportunities, ensuring effective pastoral care, casting vision, setting strategy – and enabling our Diocese to be the best it can be, for the sake of Jesus and the Church and the world he loves.

Mission and Ministry

Releasing the Gifts of All

t was a fruitful year in equipping many more people in our diocese to follow God's call on their lives, with 25 ordination candidates successfully completing the discernment process and beginning ordination training in 2023, and the ordination of 18 deacons and 16 priests in Winchester Cathedral at Petertide. We also welcomed new Licensed Lay Ministers (LLM) began training in 2023, along with 12 new candidates for the Bishop's Permission to Preach (BPP). In October, a further 80 people from across the diocese were licensed as lay ministers into various ministries, including preaching, leading worship and pastoral care.

The focus of 2023 was on building support networks for the various groups ministering within the diocese and increasing the opportunities they had to meet and pray together, to feel affirmed and connected. We held networking meetings all around the diocese for chaplains, for youth and family workers, for spiritual directors and for LLMs. This was in addition to a full programme of workshops on preaching, spirituality and discipleship, some well received Quiet Days, and the Lay Ministry Celebration Day which has become a firm fixture in the calendar!

It was encouraging to gather together in September for a Bishop's Study Day, facilitated by Emma Buchan, the Archbishop's Evangelism Task Group Project Leader, as we shared ideas around encouraging children and young people to become active disciples. This event signalled an ongoing diocesan commitment to 'growing younger' in line with the national church goal of doubling the number of children and young people by 2030.

Flourishing Links Overseas

here were two key diocesan-link visits in 2023: in February, representatives from the Education team, including two headteachers from our schools, and from the Winchester School of Mission, travelled to Rwanda to see some key partners, particularly focusing on mutual benefits and reciprocity for children and teachers in UK schools and in Rwanda, teaching in schools and contributing to a tree planting social enterprise.

In August, Bishop Debbie and a team from Andover Parish and Romsey Abbey travelled to Burundi to reinvigorate a companion link that dates back to the 1970s, taking part in a clergy conference and then travelling to a further three dioceses, meeting many representatives and being encouraged by the stories of hope and transformation.

Channeling National Resources

e started 2023 with five ongoing resource church projects (in Andover Parish, St Wins Totton, Basingstoke Resource Church, St Mike's Bournemouth, and St Barnabas, Southampton (based in initially at St Mary's)) funded by the national church Strategic Development Fund (SDF) for a total of just over £5 million. By the end of the year, these parishes had a combined figure of 1,340 weekly worshippers, an increase of 300 from 2022 (and an increase of 932 since the projects started). The churches have continued to see a vibrant development of the faith and discipleship in their worshippers and a combined total of 342 people followed the Alpha course across the five parishes during the year.

In July, we were delighted to be awarded our first round of Diocesan Investment Programme (DIP) funding, receiving £4.5 million over a five-year period, which will allow us to revitalise worship in six parishes in Bournemouth and Southampton, and build on the success of our Benefice of the Future programme to support a further nine rural multi-parish benefices. During the autumn, the first two parish revitalisation projects were launched at Lord's Hill in Southampton and St Andrew's Charminster in Bournemouth. We also undertook a mini bidding round to select our first three projects to Grow Rural Parishes (in Sherfield on Loddon, Thorngate & Blackwater and a joint project between Bright Waters and Overton).

Support for Schools

he Portsmouth & Winchester Joint Diocesan Education Team supports 140 schools with 39,000 pupils, engaging with the children, their families, and teachers. Our resources to support schools are also increasingly being used by Community schools and other dioceses — particularly in the areas of Courageous Advocacy and Racial Justice. The Education Project for 2023 was 'Everyday Ubuntu' (based on the African philosophy often translated as 'I am because we are') which schools and many parishes embraced and used to reflect on our connected humanity. We also continue as the Diocese with the most number of schools achieving the Christian Aid Global Neighbours Award, engaging and empowering pupils as agents of change in the transformation of our world.

Supporting Church Life

he Parish Support team were very busy in 2023, working often in the background to support and equip our churches and communities, through training, advice and hosting the occasional cream tea! Some of the highlights of the events programme included well attended training for churchwardens with some great feedback, and the first post-Covid Treasurers event with a speaker from Association of Church Accountants and Treasurers.

The team also completed a full year of Deanery Roadshows (six in total, where we chatted to 645 people!), setting up camp in churches around the diocese, answering questions and enabling people to get to know some of the faces the diocesan team and how they can help, as we continue in our work to develop a culture of presence and collaboration with parishes.

In Focus: A New Identity for the Parish of Four Saints

The Parish Support Team work closely with church teams when it comes to parishes seeking help with reorganization and mergers. There were 14 successful schemes in 2023, including the creation of the Parish of Four Saints which was formed on 1st October 2023 through the merger of St Francis of Assisi, Charminster and the Parish of Winton, Moordown and Charminster (the Parish of WMC). "Some really wonderful relationships have come out of it where we've all felt able to bring something to the table," said Kate Bicknell, Church Warden of Four Saints.

In Focus: Specialist Help and Support in Challenging Times

The Diocesan Advisory Committee staff team processed 292 new applications in 2023 and conducted over 70 meetings with parishes directly.

One very pertinent example from 2023 was the team's help and support of All Saints, Mudeford following a devastating fire at the church, providing specialist advice on crucial issues surrounding the design and approach to the new building project and arranging for early discussions with external interested stakeholders.

Encouraging a Culture of Generosity

ne of the greatest successes of 2023 as the contactless card reader roll-out throughout September. Part of the national Digital Giving Rollout initiative, the diocese offered 44 heavily subsidised card readers to parishes, as well as ongoing training and support, allowing them to take a significant step forward in meeting the evolving financial needs of their communities. Participating churches have since collectively raised £40,989 through their card machines and online platforms!

"The impact has been huge. It's helped to engage both regular churchgoers and visitors to the church by placing it in the entrance to the church. We've also used the machine to galvanise one off gifts for particular appeals or fundraising, including at Christmas time. By creating separate campaigns and having a simple mechanism of giving, we've also seen those who regularly give through planned monthly giving going further in their generosity and supporting additional appeals which has been really encouraging as we seek to see this culture grow in the church family." In addition, Generous June took place 11-18 June 2023 and was a great success, with over 1700 page views of the website and its various resources, designed to help parishes engage their congregation in giving and stewardship. As well as the well-received podcast series, two video sermons from Revd Marianne Foster and Bishop David were shared widely amongst our communities, and five of our curates volunteered to be guest preachers in a new context, bringing fresh perspectives on what it means to be a generous church!

Pursuing Kingdom Justice

t was also a year when the diocese took significant strides in tackling areas of injustice and inequality in church life which have identified as key national priorities. Using grant funds from the national church, we were able to appoint a Diocesan Environment Officer and a Net Zero & Racial Justice Project Co-ordinator, who began galvanising our efforts in these vital areas. A new racial justice committee was formed, bringing together people committed to seeing the generous and inclusive Kingdom of God replicated in all our diocesan processes and structures.

Similarly, building on the work of the Diocesan Environment Group, the team is increasingly supporting parishes and schools to embed Creation Care in church life, responding seriously to climate change emergency and the call on all our lives to be stewards of God's creation.

The diocesan team worked with St Mark's Kempshott when their heating system failed, helping advise them on suppliers and grants in order to install a new system using BioLPG system which does not rely on fossil fuels and reduces in CO2 emissions by up to 85%.



To gain their Silver Eco Church award, St Mark's used an Energy Efficiency Survey subsidised by the diocese to ratify changes to their building and churchyard. Other activities included a Green Fayre (pictured above).
