Christchurch Deanery

Our Vision

In the New Forest Edge Benefice, we want to serve our local communities with the good news of Jesus Christ who came to give his life as a ransom for many. Our passion is to see our congregations across five church buildings thriving and growing in Christian maturity and witness. Our prayer is that God will be glorified as each church responds to the particular needs and opportunities of its local context.

Each church offers faithful biblical preaching which aspires to be engaging and accessible, consistent with mainstream Christianity in the Anglican tradition. We seek to be a benefice of generous orthodoxy, clear on our convictions and loving in our engagement with others.

Each church honours God by developing a clear sense of church family and fellowship in which everyone is welcomed, loved, supported, challenged and encouraged.

We strongly believe that our churches should play an active role in our communities, particularly to help others to come to know God - the church in the community, and the community in the church. Our desire is to draw people into the church by holding regular events within and outside the church buildings as part of the broad mission of God.







Church Life Across the Benefice

At the heart of our benefice is a desire to proclaim Christ faithfully and clearly. We are committed to grounding all that we do in God's word. While we value the rhythm of the Lectionary, we intentionally shape our Sunday services around expository sermon series, journeying together through books of the Bible across all our churches.

Discipleship continues beyond Sundays. Bible study groups meet throughout the week across the benefice, helping us grow deeper in our knowledge and love of the Lord. We also periodically run weekday evening events, retreats and trips for senior members.

Throughout the year we come together for benefice-wide events such as joint services on fifth Sundays of the month, our weekly Saturday morning sea swimming group, summer BBQs and other times of fellowship where our extended church family unites in the name of Christ.

Since going into vacancy in summer 2025, the relationship between the churches has deepened and there is an increasing commitment to shared ministry and meeting together.

Our churches place great value on ministry with children and families. We run Explorers and Pathfinders children's groups on Sundays at St Mary's, and Little Stars, a thriving toddler group, during the week.

Music enriches our sung worship across the Benefice. All our churches have an organ, Burley and Hinton have their own choirs, and Bransgore is blessed with a contemporary band (guitar, piano and cajon). Together, these gifts enable us to glorify God in a rich variety of ways.











Church Life Across the Benefice

As well as activities aimed at discipleship, we have a rich network of relationships with our local communities.

We run regular Christianity Explored courses, or similar evangelistic offerings, based in varying locations across the benefice, or partnered with Bransgore Community Church, with whom we also support a community coffee shop. Each congregation also welcomes community members for special seasonal services throughout the year.

We have strong links with the Church of England primary school in Bransgore, leading weekly assemblies, welcoming the school into the St Mary's building for various services over the year and receiving many visitors to child-friendly services advertised through the school. We have three governor positions on the school board. There are growing links too with the primary schools in Burley and Sopley.

We also hold a weekly Fareshare community food larder fighting food waste and helping those in hardship. This is hosted from St Mary's, using the car park and church hall.

Our Organisation Governance

The New Forest Edge Benefice was formed in 2023 incorporating the parishes of Bransgore, Burley, Hinton Admiral and Sopley.

Each parish is governed by its own PCC. We have active wardens, treasurers, secretaries and safeguarding officers, reflecting the generosity of our church members in taking on significant responsibilities. All Saints Thorney Hill is a chapel of ease and has representation on Bransgore PCC.

As a result of a recent Growing Rural Parishes Programme grant, we have been able to recruit a new administrator to work for the whole benefice to bring together critical administrative services and update communications under up-to-date IT systems. This includes work on a new website. As part of the grant, we also have funding available to enhance our youth work.

We are also actively considering our governance structure and are undertaking consultations with input from experienced practitioners to look at various options for reorganisation which will allow administrative streamlining without jeopardising the voice and unique identity of each individual congregation.




Our Organisation Finance

Financial challenges are part of life for most parishes and we're no exception. We do have excellent finance teams of highly experienced laypeople, assisted by some professional help, all working hard to honour God's provision and steward it well. The four parishes currently operate their finances separately under the control of their respective PCCs.

It is a matter of regret that we have not been able to pay our collective CMF request in full for the last four years. In 2024 the four parishes paid £86,994, representing 57% of the CMF request, and contributions are likely to be in the same order in 2025. We are challenged to live out the joy of giving in response to God's love for us across our benefice in a meaningful way, highlighting the pressing need for a fresh approach to giving and stewardship.

Many parishes, and particularly Burley, who pay 100% of their individual CMF, have reserves, but significant proportions of these are restricted as to their use. Each church takes responsibility for their own finances with detailed quarterly reports to the church committees. We are committed to the Parish Giving Scheme.



Our Five Churches

St Mary's Bransgore is a church shaped by the need to reach out to the community around them with the Gospel of Christ, building upon thriving children's work and underpinned by faithful Bible teaching.



St John's Burley is committed to its growing links with all generations in the village, especially the local primary school, children's work in the church, and evangelistic outreach opportunities.



St Michael's Hinton aims to further develop its focus on traditional worship from the Book of Common Prayer and its growing choral tradition.



St Michael's Sopley has grown substantially over the past two years, both numerically and spiritually, whilst still enjoying a substantial wedding ministry.



All Saints Thorney Hill enjoys traditional services in a beautiful building but we aim to increasingly serve the needs of the local Traveller community.





St Mary the Virgin Bransgore

St Mary the Virgin Church is located in the lovely village of Bransgore on the edge of the New Forest. St Mary's is a lively and friendly church that meets to celebrate and rejoice in the Word of God.

St Mary's has an average weekly congregation of approximately 60 people with a range of different ages: from the eight-month-old to the eighty-year-old. The church has fifteen to twenty children in attendance on average, and families are a key ministry in our church. Apart from our monthly all-age service, we run two Sunday school groups every week with fantastic leaders providing faithful and engaging teaching from the Bible. After each service, we have an important time of fellowship over coffee and cake and our fellowship regularly extends beyond the time limitations of church services, with various social activities for us to come together as a church family.

Our current service is a mixture of modern and traditional, with a band (guitar, piano and cajon) and the organ dividing the music between them. Our church is very much at the heart of the community for the significant services such as Easter Sunday, Remembrance Day, Christingle, Nativity and Nine Lessons and Carols, with many of these occasions being standing room only.

At St Mary's, the two churchwardens have taken responsibility for coordinating the Sunday morning services during the interregnum with most of the leading and preaching coming from within the congregation. We have been extremely encouraged by the way people have stepped up to serve in this period.

The church is affiliated with the local Church of England primary school, which is next to the church, and we have good links with Bransgore Community Church.







St John the Baptist Burley

We are a vibrant worshipping community, with a curate, two LLMs and a choir, offering a range of service styles which reflect the diversity of our congregation. We also have a small growing ministry to young couples and families.

Regular, evangelistic activities include one-off talks, Bible study groups, Hope Explored and Christianity Explored courses and 'The Bereavement Journey'. We also host a 'food for thought' luncheon.

We have numerous village connections, including a gentle exercise group, foot clinic, craft group, coffee mornings and links to the local primary school. We also offer addiction support.

Our Mission Statement is 'All for Christ & Christ for All'.

The church was built in 1838, the land being given by Sir John Lefevre, Lord of the Manor of Burley. In 2009 the St Mary Magdelene Chapel was added for smaller services, private prayer and reflection. Both are in excellent condition and state of repair.







St Michael and All Angels Hinton Admiral

Is a very traditional Victorian village church with roots going back into the 12th century. The church today was completed in 1873, and has a unique reredos made of Portland stone, donated by the Meyrick family.

The wonderful Hill and Sons organ has just been fully restored much to the delight of the congregation. The average Sunday attendance is 25 at our traditional BCP sung Eucharist or Matins (due to clergy availability) service every Sunday at 9:00am.

Fundraising is always at the forefront of our minds. The church is uniquely placed, at the heart of the Hinton Admiral Estate, to collaborate with the current Sir George and Lady Meyrick in major fundraising activities.

For example, through garden openings at Hinton Admiral, or via their nearby wellbeing hub and events field. The church is in a position to become a key part of 'Harmony', the King's Foundation's vision of balance and interconnectedness, which the Estate has joined, becoming a 'living lab' for promoting the King's vision. The Meyricks are also enthusiastic about supporting the pioneering idea of a 'forest church' in their nearby woodland.

Our church has a choir of nine, a bell ringing team and an active friends and social committee that strengthens our fellowship amongst the congregation and wider community.

Given that the congregation at Hinton are not, in the majority "of the parish" and that very few people living in the parish attend this church, St Michael's church life and culture is more reflective of those who worship there. Worship, love of God and each other, support, comradeship and social togetherness are present in abundance among a dynamic group of mature adults who support the wider mission of the benefice.







St Michael and All Angels Sopley

St. Michael and All Angels is a Grade II* listed church in the village of Sopley, founded in the 11th century.

Sopley Church has a congregation that is growing numerically and spiritually. The weekly community outreach, Fareshare, which was set up by Rev. Mo Pimenta, has been a real harvest field. We have recently had Bishop Rhiannon come to us for 5 confirmations, and at the same time, had 2 baptisms and one reaffirmation of baptismal vows.

The church is looked after pastorally and led by the curate, Rev. Mo Pimenta. We now have a small number of families with young children and we are working on accommodating them further into the life of the church beyond the children's talks we have already started.

This beautiful church hosts many weddings and baptisms as part of its ministry. We are fortunate to have a very skilled organist and an excellent pipe organ.

There is a thriving band of bell ringers, who meet weekly at practices which alternate between Sopley and Hinton, and ring both for Sunday services and weddings. The work of our flower ladies is much admired and enhances the church. The "Friends of Sopley church" is a separate charity which actively raises funds for the upkeep of the church fabric.







All SaintsThorney Hill

The beautiful church of All Saints,
Thorney Hill has been described as a
"Jewel of the New Forest".

It was built in 1906 in the memory of Christine Manners who died in India at the age of 17. One of the key features of the church is the stunning mural, which was completed in 1922 by Phoebe Traquair.

All Saints is an intimate church. The services are taken by a member of the clergy or a LLM. All Saints follows the tradition of the Book of Common Prayer, with a service of sung Matins or the Eucharist, accompanied by an organ.

Occasional musical events are held throughout the year, which help with the upkeep of the church, and our candlelight carol service always fills the church to capacity.







The Current Benefice Service Pattern

Each of our churches has a service every Sunday across the benefice, except on the fifth Sunday of the month when we join together for a joint benefice service. At present, services are being led by a mixture of the ordained and lay licensed ministry team, alongside a team of lay volunteers, including several of the churchwardens.

The Vicarage

The vicarage is a four-bedroom detached home in the sought-after village of Bransgore, a very short walk from St Mary's and the well-respected local primary school, and next to an award-winning thatched pub.

It has a spacious living room, a separate dining area, a large kitchen, and a study and has recently had a new roof installed, as well as a replacement to the boiler and double glazing downstairs. Work to replace the kitchen along with various other improvements has already started. The house also includes a garage and a generous garden, providing excellent outdoor space.

The closest beaches are a 10 minute drive away, with varied, gorgeous and interesting historical coastline extending away in both directions. The vicarage is also on the doorstep of the New Forest National Park, which covers 219 square miles of ancient woodland and open heathland, famous for its free-roaming ponies and charming villages.

The neighbourhood offers a strong community feel and convenient access to the surrounding countryside, while being close to Christchurch and transport links for wider travel. Between the sea and the New Forest, this peaceful area supports an outdoor lifestyle with many activities available from cycling trails and water sports to beach saunas and cream teas.
