

Welcome to the Alresford Deanery

Close to the historic Cathedral city of Winchester we are a very rural deanery of five benefices and twenty-six churches with a rich diversity of tradition set in a large area of beautiful Hampshire countryside bordering Basingstoke to its North East and Winchester to the West.

We have a mix of stipendiary clergy, Focal Ministers, Licensed Lay Ministers and Licensed Lay Worship Leaders.

Recently Alresford Deanery has agreed to be in partnership with its neighbouring Alton Deanery, being held in plurality. We are now holding joint chapter meetings and Deanery Synods working towards common vision and strategy.

Arle Valley currently has three Focal Ministers who are commissioned to serve in their local communities.

There are currently warm conversations between representatives of Arle Valley Benefice and Parish of the Itchen Valley exploring ways of working more closely together that facilitate stronger ministry to schools and families as well as thinking about shared services. Discussions are wide ranging with the desired outcome that priests and all lay people involved in ministry might, through greater collaboration, better serve their respective communities and churches.

The Arle Valley Benefice

The Arle Valley Benefice brings together four unified and vibrant churches: St. John the Baptist Church in the market town of New Alresford, St. Mary the Virgin in the village of Old Alresford, All Saints Church in Brighton and the Parish of Ovington (St. Peter's) and Itchen Stoke. St. Mary's Church in Itchen Stoke is now cared for by the Churches Conservation Trust.

We aim to be intergenerational churches at the heart of our communities in which everyone can flourish, and where people can discover the extravagant love of God.

We are a church family that is made up of people from very different and varied church backgrounds. We try hard to make new people feel welcome, and to care for one another with love and kindness. We don't always get things right and we don't have all the answers, but we do try to be faithful Christians, living lives in our local community that reflect the teachings of Jesus.

Sunday mornings begin with a warm welcome and an invitation to join us in celebrating the good news about Jesus Christ. Our worship is varied to meet the needs of our village communities and encompasses traditional and contemporary worship.

Our churches are often used for concerts, fundraising and social events where we love to welcome our communities.

All parishes contribute to the Benefice Office which supports us all with benefice administration.

Each church has its own identity and tradition but whatever the mode of worship, we expect God to meet with us and speak to us.





Our Churches

St. John the Baptist, New Alresford

St. John's is a multi-generational church community in the heart of New Alresford where everyone receives a warm welcome. There is a mix of traditional and contemporary worship because we love the rich heritage of the church whilst seeking to be relevant to our ever-changing culture.

The four Licensed Lay Ministers give support and we have two worship leaders. There is a team of experienced pastoral visitors, including specialist bereavement and hospital teams. We belong to Churches Together in Alresford and there is an active fundraising charity associated with the church called the Friends of St. John's.

There are seven established home groups and we run an Alpha course regularly – this course has led to a number of baptisms and confirmations. We also run a variety of other groups and activities for all ages, which offer support, friendship and prayer.

St. John's has particularly close mission links in Zimbabwe as well as supporting Shanthigramam in India, and has connections with the Holy Land.

We have good links with the infant and junior schools. We host a weekly informal youth group Chill, Chat and Chomp, Monday Meet and Eat for primary aged children after school, and Chatterbox, a baby and toddlers' group.

The annual Crib service and Light Party are extremely popular with local children and families. We recognise that children and young people are the future of the church and to this end we are praying for, and seeking to appoint, a Benefice Children's and Families worker. As God leads us in this endeavour, we need to be faithful in prayer trusting that God will provide the solution that brings him glory and leads many people to Christ.



A Church for Our Community

Our vision for the church building is that we share a partnership with the community – both contribute to the mission of the Church in Alresford.

St. John's is situated in the heart of Alresford, set back slightly from the main high street and accessed by a number of pedestrian paths. Every day people walk past the church on their way to the town or the heritage line railway station.

The large, open churchyard is maintained by volunteers, together with some paid help, and is a good resource for the town.

Prayer is at the centre of all our activities and we encourage the use of prayer through: Prayer Space, Lady Chapel, Prayer Table, Votive Candle Stand along with a Prayer Tree in the porch.

As we seek to offer friendship, hospitality and refuge to all, the building joins in with that mission: we are keen that the building realises its potential for welcoming flexibility and openness, without losing its precious heritage.

THE JOHN PEARSON HALL

Our open and welcoming large hall is in regular use by church and community groups.

CREATION CARE

Our enthusiastic Creation Care Team has guided the church to achieve Bronze award status and we are currently working towards Silver level. We recognise that this is an ongoing process and acknowledge that there are great benefits raising the profile of eco-church within the wider town community.



New Alresford

THE TOWN

New Alresford is a picturesque market town midway between Winchester and Alton. There is an exceptional number of clubs, societies, coffee shops and pubs which contribute to a very lively community atmosphere, and St. John's church is situated at its heart. There is a thriving weekly market, and a small amount of light industry which provides local employment.

Alresford is a focus for the many pilgrims who pass on their pilgrimage from Winchester to Canterbury or on the Camino Way to Santiago Compostella.

It is also known as the UK's capital of watercress farming and as the home of the Mid-Hants Steam Railway – the Watercress Line.

The annual Watercress Festival attracts in excess of 15,000 visitors, many of whom return to enjoy the beautiful surrounding countryside and river walks.

With the population currently at about 6,000, housing is varied and includes some social provision as well as sheltered housing and a new retirement complex.

In addition, there is a development of some 300 new houses currently under construction.

SCHOOLS

INFANT AND JUNIORS

Sun Hill Infant and Preschool and the Sun Hill Junior School are very active and enjoy a strong relationship with the wider community.

SECONDARY

Perins School is part of the "Seven Alresford Schools" group and uses feeder schools to help define its catchment area, including Sun Hill Infant and Preschool, Sun Hill Junior School, Cheriton Primary School, Ropley Primary School, Preston Candover Primary School, and Four Marks Primary School.



St. Mary the Virgin, Old Alresford

St. Mary's is a friendly and welcoming congregation and there is a committed PCC of 9 members, including the Focal Minister and the Churchwarden.

Many visit the church because it is the birthplace of the Mothers' Union. Mary Sumner, its founder, was the wife of the Rector at St. Mary's from 1850 – 1885. In 2015, the south transept, together with a new window, were dedicated to her memory. An annual service to celebrate her life is held in August.

Currently, we are nearing the end of raising funds to install a small kitchen servery and disabled access toilet in the church. All the necessary permissions have been obtained and it is hoped this work will start in the near future. This will, we hope, make the church much more flexible in the way it can be used, for both church and other local events.

There is a keen team of bellringers who practice weekly and ring on two Sundays each month as well as on other occasions.

Old Alresford Cottage is a care home situated close to the church. The Focal Minister, usually assisted by a member of the congregation, holds a short service there each month.

It's our aim, going forward, to provide more opportunities for all in the community to learn more about our faith, whether through coming to services or attending a group run here or elsewhere in the benefice.



A Church for Our Community

St. Mary's is open every day and attracts many visitors throughout the year. It is on the Camino Way from Reading to Southampton and pilgrims who call in to the church are invited to help themselves to refreshment.

A recently introduced bookstall in the church porch is proving very popular and brings in welcome funds.

A monthly coffee morning for all ages is run by a team from St. Mary's in the village hall. This is a well-attended and lively occasion, attracting those who don't have a direct contact with St. Mary's, as well as those who do.

OUR VILLAGE

The rural village of Old Alresford lies in the countryside one mile north of New Alresford.

Together with its eight surrounding hamlets it has a population of c. 600 including some 60 children. Most residents, mainly professionals, travel further afield for their work.

The village hall is very well-used for many activities, including TOADS, (the popular amateur dramatic society), annual pantomime and other productions.

A weekly post office is held in the village hall, as well as other regular classes and group meetings.

The adjoining village green is the site of the annual village fair and fireworks display.



The Parish of Ovington and Itchen Stoke

St. Peter's is a small but committed congregation and with the support of focal and lay ministers hold two to three services a month.

St. Peter's first started hosting 'Cafe Church' nine years ago and these services have now become part of the intrinsic nature of what we offer at St. Peter's. It brings to the community a wonderful opportunity to enter the church to enjoy a coffee and a chat, before we then join together, very informally, to consider and discuss a theme or a word or an idea.

This style of 'worship' has brought about a considerable feeling of fellowship. We learn from each other's experiences, and about each other's faith. We are often challenged to reflect and contemplate on this, resulting in a spiritual growth. We share and engage with each other in a way that isn't possible with liturgy. This allows us to become vulnerable with each other and that therefore cultivates an intimacy, providing a deeper sense of community.

A fabric fund is maintained which has financed major restorations in recent years. We have considered a conversion of 25% of pew space to an open plan meeting area for other users of the church, but this type of development would require a much higher level of fundraising.

Itchen Stoke has St. Mary's Church which is now cared for by the Churches Conservation Trust and kept open for visitors. Occasional services are held by the Arle Valley Benefice by candlelight only, since this church has no electricity or water or toilet installation.

A Church for Our Community

The villages of Ovington and Itchen Stoke are situated just under 2 miles west from the centre of New Alresford lie either side of the River Itchen, well known to anglers and surrounded by farm land and water meadows with pleasant walks, all within the South Downs National Park. The population of the two villages together with outlying farmhouses and hamlets is around 300.

As a social centre, apart from the Bush pub, St. Peter's is the only place or reason for community involvement. Church events play an important role in bringing the community together and provide an opportunity to fundraise for the parish.

There is an annual cricket match against a team from St. John's, and other events include the village fete, carol singing on Christmas Eve around the village ending up in the pub, concerts, safari suppers, bridge drives, lectures etc.

We are looking at holding different events in the church that will welcome non-regular church goers. The PCC is motivated to keep an active church for future generations.



All Saints Church, Brighton

All Saints Church is of Norman construction and is well-maintained thanks to generous residents who hold it in high esteem.

At All Saints we are fortunate in being part of a diocesan Focal Ministry scheme which has proved to be a great success and is much appreciated by the Parishioners.

Normally the congregation at our Sunday morning service averages around 15, with 50+ on special occasions and at festivals.

Our need is for the new Incumbent to work with the Focal Minister particularly on outreach, and to continue to provide in our church monthly Holy Communion.

The Church Electoral Roll stands at 30. There is a strong and active PCC which currently meets 4/5 times a year.

We have a Diocesan Parish Mission Action Plan (pMap) in place to help us focus on the following objectives:

- To include and involve current church members in events, and to reach out to the whole community across all ages.
- To increase participation in and support for regular worship

These objectives are in line with our aim to grow the kingdom of Jesus Christ in scope and depth in our parish.



A Church for Our Community

Situated some 3 miles north-east of Alresford, the parish comprises the villages of Bighton and the neighbouring settlement of Gundleton totalling about 140 households.

The most popular church and community activities are:

- Mothering Sunday service involving children in various ways;
- Easter Day service (with an Easter egg hunt in the churchyard!);
- Harvest Thanksgiving and Harvest Lunch in the Village Hall;
- Remembrance Sunday is always very well attended;
- On Advent Sunday there is an open invitation to activities with tea and cake in the village hall – “real Advent Calendars” are distributed to every family in the parish;
- Mid-December Carol Service;
- Christmas Midnight Communion.

We are in the process of developing and assembling a welcome pack for newcomers to our community.

A village WhatsApp group helps to maintain support for those who need help with transport and other village issues.

Alongside the Church, other community facilities are the Village Hall and the well-regarded pub, The Three Horseshoes.

Our local monthly community magazine, the 'Big Gun News' is distributed to every household in the Parish giving details of local events and activities.

The biggest event in the community calendar is the Annual Fete, held in early September, with a wide variety of activities and events; the money raised is divided equally between the Church and the Village Hall.

Our Organisation

GOVERNANCE

Each of the four Benefice Churches benefit from a PCC. They are able to listen to the needs of their Parish and provide support to the incumbent and Focal Ministers concerning how those needs can be met. All the PCC's meet regularly to discuss matters relating to God's mission, services, and practical issues such as building maintenance. Some have sub-committees dealing with particular areas such as Fabric or Health and Safety.

Parishes have church wardens who lead the day-to-day management of church life, in conjunction with the incumbent and where available a Focal Minister. All church wardens meet regularly with Ministers as a group, to consider Benefice/Parish requirements including joint services and how they are conducted.

Each PCC has a designated post as Treasurer and Secretary, although there are vacancies at present.

All the PCCs have access to the Benefice Administrator who works 22.5 hours a week.

All four Church buildings are well looked after and benefit from people in each parish that care about them. These are a mix of people that attend services regularly and those that do not.

SAFEGUARDING

Safeguarding is an integral part of the life and ministry of the church. We are committed to maintaining environments that are safe for all children, young people and adults and to creating nurturing, caring conditions within our church. Our policy complies with Diocesan requirements including necessary training and appropriate DBS checks.

We have two Benefice Safeguarding Officers. We regularly ensure that the Diocesan Safeguarding Dashboard is kept up-to-date and all the actions are taken very seriously.



Communication

The Arle Valley Churches website is our single most important communication tool, serving to provide an initial point of contact to anyone reaching out to us for the first time. We strive through the design and content to convey a warm welcome to everyone in the wider community and to provide a readily available source of regularly updated information.

It is a fact that just over 90% of people seeking information initially do so online. Having information helps to extend an open invitation to prospective congregation members. It provides an insight into what type of ministry they will experience, as well as a sense of community, welcome and support.

So, before even taking the tentative steps of turning up in person, it can hopefully answer the question 'Is this the type of church I would want to belong to?' Those first impressions are so important.

We seek to ensure that our website continues to grow and develop for the benefit of our communities and mission to spreading the word of God.

Discipleship and Faith Development

Bible Study/Lent & Advent Groups/Home Groups

Small groups of people meet in fellowship to study the bible and pray together. These groups usually gather in one of the members' homes and also enjoy refreshments together. Lent Groups are usually organised by Churches Together in Alresford which gives an opportunity for wider discussions outside our usual congregations.

We are always looking for innovative ways to engage with those who are not currently involved in church and encourage those who are curious to explore their faith. Our fourth Sunday service, Celtic Service of the Word along with our Alpha Courses have been particularly successful in welcoming new people to St. John's.

Alpha Courses

We love running Alpha courses! Our last Alpha course was in summer 2025 and we had 14 participants (not just for the food!)

Care in the Community

It is an essential part of our church mission to reach out to and support our local communities. In our aim to be a visible Christian presence in the town and villages, we run numerous events and groups and offer pastoral care to anyone in need.

Supported Housing, Care and Retirement Homes

As part of our pastoral care and community outreach, our small, mostly lay-led ministry team visit Bailey House, Ellingham Close and Old Alresford Cottage once a month and offer a short communion service with hymns, a reading and short talk. They also take a monthly Home Communion out to those who are housebound.

Everyone is encouraged to join in the service and hymns and share their thoughts on the message of the readings and talk, or just to have a good old chat at the end of the service.



Children, Young People and Families

BREAKFAST CHURCH

On the second Sunday of the month, our 9:30am service is a more informal service that is designed to appeal to all ages but has a specific focus on those with young families.

The service lasts about 40-50 minutes and has three hymns which are accompanied by our Music Group. There is a relaxed beginning to Breakfast Church with the opportunity to have tea, coffee and tasty food!

CHATTERBOX

For 0 – 4s, every Thursday from 10 – 11am. Currently attended by about 12 families (children and their parents or carers). Drinks and snacks served. We finish by singing together before we say goodbye.

CHILL, CHAT AND CHOMP

This discipleship group of about eight young people meets on Wednesday evenings at 5pm in the West Room in St. John's. It is a place for young people to have fun and explore their Christian faith.



FAMILIES @ 4

We gather together on the 1st Sunday of every month at St. John's for some shared time to chat and relax while the children have a chance to roam, play and explore.

Families enjoy fun interactive storytelling, songs, a great craft session and a cuppa. Currently we have babies and toddlers to teens and everyone in between.

MONDAY MEET AND EAT






